## Bethel Point-In-Time Count & Project Homeless Connect: January 28, 2025

The Point-In-Time Count is the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) national annual count of unsheltered and sheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. Data were collected through surveys and observations by the Bethel Housing and Homelessness Coalition. Data include all 60 people who stayed at Bethel Winter House (BWH) and all 20 adults who stayed at the Tundra Women's Coalition's (TWC) emergency domestic violence/sexual assault shelter and transitional housing the night of January 27, 2025, as well as Project Homeless Connect (PHC) attendees and outreach at the library. Data were collected at BWH, TWC, PHC, and the library on January 28, 2025 (temp. -14°F).


- Total people who were 95 experiencing homelessness or at-risk of homelessness.
- 8 People attended the event who were not homeless or atrisk of homelessness and are not included in the analysis.
- **54** Total attended Project Homeless Connect (13 surveys, 33 attendees surveyed or observed at BWH, 8 not eligible)


- People were observed (did not complete 14 surveys) at TWC (6) and BWH (8).
- People completed surveys who were homeless or at-risk of homelessness, including temporarily staying with friends/family and transitional housing. Surveyed during outreach (1), at PHC (13), BWH - both overnight and morning attendees (53), TWC shelter and transitional housing (14).
- People (14%) surveyed had not been surveyed 11 prior. 2 at PHC and 9 at TWC.

**15 Bethel Housing and Homelessness Coalition volunteers** conducted the surveys from: • AVCP Regional Housing Authority • Bethel Community Services Foundation • Bethel Winter House • Public Health Nursing • Tundra Women's Coalition

Comparison: In 2024, 86 total people experiencing or at-risk of homelessness; 80 surveys done





**HUD-Defined Homelessness** 

- Literal homelessness (emergency shelter or place not meant for habitation)
- 86% Less than 7 nights in temporary housing situation (literal homeless right before)
  - Less than 90 nights in an institution (literal homeless right before)
  - Not experiencing HUD-definition of homelessness




Notes: Bethel Winter House was closed 05.01.2024-10.01.2024 so people could not have stayed there for more than 1 year continuously at the time of the survey.


Additionally, this section's data reflects <u>continuous</u> nights at the specific location, not cumulative.


79% of the people who were experiencing the HUD definition of homelessness (70% of all survey participants) have been experiencing an episode of homelessness longer than just their current location, i.e., they've moved between places, but always in a homeless situation.



In Bethel, we are also interested in how long individuals have been staying temporarily with friends or family to understand overcrowding and "couch surfing" in our community. We are therefore using a broader concept, housing instability, which would include these situations.










communities they would be willing to live in:

villages)








